INSTRUCTIONAL FRAMEWORK

Modeled on Florida's B.E.S.T. ELA standards structure, this plan is intentionally **standards-agnostic**. Learning targets focus on high-level literacy skills applicable in diverse school contexts globally [cite: 9, 10].

Emotional Safety & Norms

- **Optional Participation:** Sharing is always a choice [cite: 9, 10].
- **Story-Based:** Keep prompts focused on Charlotte's experiences [cite: 9, 10].
- **Steady Reassurance:** "You did nothing wrong. Love stays" [cite: 9, 10].
- **Support:** Offer non-verbal or quiet exit choices if distressed [cite: 9, 10].

Supplies Needed

- *The Memory Box and Charlotte's Big Surprise* [cite: 9, 10]
- Emotion cards & Chart paper [cite: 9, 10]
- Small box per student (shoebox/cigar box) [cite: 9, 10]
- Decoration: Paints, markers, collage media [cite: 9, 10]
- Student journals and pencils [cite: 9, 10]

The Memory Box Construct (Required)

An instructional tool—not a craft add-on. The box belongs to the student; sharing is optional [cite: 9, 10].

Acceptable: Shoebox, cleaned cigar boxes, gift boxes, or plastic containers [cite: 9, 10].

Decoration: Paint, markers, paper, or collage. Real photos not required [cite: 9, 10].

Teacher Tip: "Your box belongs to you. You decide what goes in it" [cite: 9, 10].

Target: I can write a claim about the story's message and support it with details [cite: 9, 10].

Lesson Flow (45–60 min)

- **Opening (5 min):** "How can love stay even when remembering changes?" [cite: 9, 10]
- **Read-Aloud (15 min):** Note moments that support the central idea [cite: 9, 10].
- **Mini-Lesson (10 min):** Model claim writing and 2 supporting details [cite: 9, 10].
- **Box Build (15 min):** Decorate + add Symbolic Item and Q&A Card [cite: 9, 10].

"Why don't memories always come back?"

Some memory pathways are harder to reach. That can change day to day [cite: 9, 10].

"How can we help someone who forgets?"

By being patient, kind, and staying connected through stories and photos [cite: 9, 10].

• **Independent Writing (15–20 min):** Claim paragraph with 2 details [cite: 9, 10].

"Is it okay to ask again and again?"

Yes. Repeating questions is how people learn and feel safe [cite: 9, 10].

EVIDENCE OF LEARNING CHECKLIST

- Participated in read-aloud discussion [cite: 9, 10]
- Identified character feelings or story message [cite: 9, 10]
- Created an individual Memory Box with at least one item [cite: 9, 10]
- Completed grade-appropriate claim/reflection paragraph [cite: 9, 10]
